

New Case Filings

Forty-two new cases were docketed by the Bankruptcy Appellate Panel in 2019. Ten of those cases (24%) were filed by pro se litigants. Of the cases filed, twenty-eight were appeals from contested matters and fourteen were appeals from adversary proceedings. The graphics below illustrate the breakdown of case origin by district.



District Court Elections

This chart compares the number of appeals taken to the District Courts with those taken to the Bankruptcy Appellate Panel. In 2019, sixty-nine appeals were taken from the Bankruptcy Courts. Thirty-six of those cases (52%) were appealed to and remained with the Bankruptcy Appellate Panel; thirty-three of the cases (48%) were appealed directly to or were transferred to the District Courts. The ratio of BAP appeals to District Court appeals remained steady from 2018 to 2019.

Case Processing Times





Case Dispositions

Thirty-six cases were closed in 2019. The court wrote a total of thirteen opinions which disposed of fifteen cases. To the left is a breakdown of the method by which each case was closed.

Opinion Breakdown

The chart to the right breaks down each opinion by its outcome. As shown in the chart, 77% of the opinions affirmed the Bankruptcy Court decisions in 2019, slightly down from 78% in 2018.



Panel Referrals

In 2019, ten initial referrals were made to Administrative Panels. In addition, three matters were referred back to prior Ad Panels, resulting in a total of thirteen Administrative Panel referrals. Five cases were submitted on the merits without oral argument and eight cases were submitted on the merits after oral argument. Hearings were held in St. Paul and St. Louis.

Judge Statistics

As reported earlier, the court issued a total of thirteen opinions in 2019. The court also issued five dispositive orders and twenty-two non-dispositive orders. A breakdown by judge of all opinions and orders issued by the court is shown in the following table.

Appeals to the U.S. Court of Appeals

A total of sixteen bankruptcy appeals were taken to the U.S. Court of Appeals in 2019. Of those appeals, twelve were from District Court decisions and four were from Bankruptcy Appellate Panel decisions.

Eight BAP cases were closed by the Court of Appeals in 2019. Following is a breakdown of the method by which BAP cases appealed to the Court of Appeals were closed:
